

**Project Report**

**January 5<sup>th</sup>, 2017, through February 1<sup>st</sup>, 2017**  
As of January 27, 2017

1. During the month, the ALERT System reported precipitation values ranging from 0.16 inches at the gauge at Red Mountain, to a high of 3.43 inches at the Calabasas Canyon gauge.
2. District Staff has started a feasibility study to look into the possibility of creating a retention/detention structure upstream of Interstate 19 in the hopes of decreasing the floodplain downstream of I-10 along Western Avenue. District Staff has submitted the grant application and is working with the Arizona Division of Emergency Management to perfect the application. Application was submitted to the State of Arizona, who has forwarded it to FEMA for final review and consideration. FEMA did not select the project for funding. None of the projects in the Western US were apparently selected for funding. District Staff will continue to seek opportunities for funding the project.
3. It was brought to the attention of District Staff that a portion of the bank protections built back in 2001-2002 have partially failed. Staff is working to evaluate and make repairs. Staff may bring forward recommendations for a long term plan for improvements at a later date. Staff has meet with the engineering firm that designed the protection and they are currently evaluating what may have been the cause of the failure and are helping to look for funds for repair. Staff has prepared and submitted eGrants Application to fund the repairs and mitigation needed to repair and strengthen the bank protection. Staff has been informed that the project was not accepted, and is working to determine the best course of action to repair the protection.
4. District Staff is working on Notices of Intent (NOI) to try to seek funding for engineering and/or construction for multiple projects, to include the Nogalitos Detention Basin, Mariposa Detention Basin, Baffert Detention Basin, and Potrero Creek Wetland Restoration. District Staff was informed that the Nogalitos Detention Basin was selected as the first alternative for funding by the State. Last week, the State informed Staff that one of the first 10 projects had dropped out and that we are now the 10<sup>th</sup> ranked project under the PDM and the application needs to be made by April 15<sup>th</sup>. The grant application has been submitted and District Staff is working with the Arizona Division of Emergency Management to perfect the application. Application has been revised and resubmitted. FEMA decided to not select the project for funding. Alternative funding for the project was approved.

5. District Staff received five (5) Site Review Applications. One (1) of the applications were from the City of Nogales.
6. District Staff received eight (8) Floodplain Use Permit applications. Three (3) of the applications were located within the City of Nogales.



## **To The Santa Cruz County Board of Supervisors:**

The Arizona Superior Court of Santa Cruz County is seeking approval of the attached plan for the use of **Fill the Gap funds for fiscal year 2016/2017. There is no County fund request involved.**

**Clerk and Court Criminal Case Processing:** Significant budget reductions that have been dealt to the courts in Santa Cruz County have severely hindered our court's ability to manage the workload in a variety of important areas. To that end I am requesting authorization to fund, in Fill the Gap dollars, a part-time Deputy Clerk position in the Superior Court Clerk's office assigned to the electronic processing of criminal case documents, and a software program for managing trial data, photos and evidentiary information. (\$14,500 – clerk; \$1,016 – software)

**Court Interpreting Training:** The Court is also requesting that Fill the Gap funds be used to cover expenditures for two staff interpreters to attend the three week Court Interpreter Institute at the University of Arizona. These funds (\$7,468.00) were approved by AOC and the Board in FY 2016, but the funds could not be used as approved because services actually did not accrue until FY2017. Those dollars were not spent, and we are re-requesting those dollars for FY 17 to be used for the same purpose as proposed last year.

**Pretrial Professional Services:** The Court has participated with Circles of Peace in a pilot project in which this local non-profit provides tracking and monitoring of select pretrial defendants and sends update reports to the judges, and reminders to defendants about court dates. (\$8,000.00)

C. PROJECT INFORMATION: THE SUPERIOR COURT SEEKS TO CONTRACT FOR PRETRIAL MONITORING AND REPORTING SERVICES WITH A LOCAL NON-PROFIT AGENCY, FUND A PART-TIME CLERK IN THE SUPERIOR COURT CLERK'S OFFICE TO SUPPORT CRIMINAL CASE DOCUMENT PROCESSING AND RETENTION, AND ENHANCE CRIMINAL CASE PROCESSING. ADDITIONALLY, THE COURT SEEKS TO PAY FOR INTENSIVE STAFF INTERPRETER TRAINING.

13. DESCRIPTION OF PROJECT PLAN.

**Pretrial Monitoring Services:** The Superior Court launched the new statewide pretrial risk assessment instrument with the assistance of Adult Probation. These assessments are now available to all Limited Jurisdiction Judges and Superior Court Judges for a large selection of criminal cases at the Initial Appearance and Arraignment hearings. The Court also conducted a pilot project in which a local non-profit organization agreed to provide pretrial monitoring services for select criminal cases as referred by the Court.

The courts referred 199 cases to Circles of Peace (Non-profit Agency) for pretrial monitoring and reporting services over the three-year pilot. An astonishing 93.5% of the referrals were successful in attending their court appearances, and not rearrested during the term of pretrial release. 3% never made contact with the agency after court, and another 3.5% failed the program due to non-compliance and a warrant issued for the arrest of those defendants. Overall, this pilot has proven quite successful. The next step is to provide supplemental dollars that support the Pretrial Monitoring Services into the next six months. Funds provided through Fill the Gap will be supported by funds from two of the larger Limited Jurisdiction Courts. This project is a model of collaboration and best practices.

**Interpreter Training:** The Court requested training dollars in last year's Fill the Gap application, and received approval to use of the funds the attendance of staff interpreters at an intensive court interpreter institute. However, the County did not allow us to use those dollars to pay for the training expenses because the course and travel incurred in this fiscal year (July 2016). We are simply requesting the same re-approval.

**A Part-time Court Clerk:** The second part of the Court's plan is to support the salary of a part-time entry-level clerk in the Superior Court who is responsible to help process criminal case files and documents.

**Trial Software:** The Superior Court installed high technology for two criminal courtrooms to include computer monitors for witnesses, the judge, the clerk, the jury and the gallery. Enhanced software is needed to manage large amounts of data, allow witness and jurors to see, in real time, an important document, and assist attorneys in being able to show the jurors pictures or documents while also highlighting sections or drawing on the screen. The software has numerous features that are intended to speed the timing of trials and jury deliberations. This package costs \$1,016.01.

#### **14. DESCRIBE THE NEED FOR THIS PROJECT AND HOW THE EXPENDITURE OF THESE MONIES WILL ADDRESS THE NEED.**

**Pretrial Monitoring Services:** We have studied our local pretrial release practices and learned that not only are judges sometimes holding defendants in custody because of their perceived risk that the defendant will re-offend but also because they believe the defendant needs services or some type of follow up to make his/her court appearances. As a court and a county, we have addressed the risk assessment needs with the assistance of Adult Probation services. Officers now provide the PSA Risk Assessment Instrument at most Initial Appearance hearings.

Due to other competing demands for the court's budget, funds are not available to address the additional monitoring need. Fill the Gap funds in this grant will provide operating and salary funds for a case manager to process referrals, track records, monitor released defendants and insure individual progress reports are provided to the judges on each case referred to the program. If the pilot project is any indication of the future, the next six months will prove very successful.

**Interpreter Training:** Given the approval of 2016 FTG funds, the Court sent two staff for intensive interpreter training to the University of Arizona Institute for Court Interpreting, a three-week program. Since the Court was unable to draw down on these funds because of the fiscal year closure, the Court seeks the re-approval of the funds, so these bills can be paid in 2017. Cost for two staff included course registration, equipment for the course, lodging, travel and per diem and was a total of \$7,468.00

**Superior Court Clerk's Criminal Case Processing:** Hundreds of criminal cases are filed with the Clerk of Superior Court every year and the FTG funds are used to pay a part time person who supports the Clerk of Court with the criminal caseload. Many positions were lost in the County's budget cuts of prior years and this part-time position has been instrumental in helping to continue managing many duties. The Clerk's Office designates several staff members to cover all criminal matters for three local Superior Court Judges as well as

visiting judges for Santa Cruz County on a weekly basis. The responsibilities of the deputy clerks assigned to criminal cases include but are not limited; to opening files received from the prosecuting agency or Limited Jurisdiction Courts, labeling files, performing data entry in AJACS, scanning/imaging criminal files, calendaring; locating files, preparing documents, processing arrest warrants, taking notes and preparing minute entries, completing disposition reports, preparing packets for DOC, and entering and reviewing case financial information.

In addition, it is important to note that the weekly Law and Motion calendars on average contain no less than thirty criminal matters, which include Arraignments, Plea Negotiations, Sentences, Reviews, Fugitive Warrants, Etc.

Furthermore, a very important responsibility of staff members assigned to criminal cases is serving as Assistant Jury Commissioners. They are responsible for scheduling and maintaining trial calendars, maintaining Jury lists, reviewing Jury questionnaires, summoning jurors for service, process jury payments, among other responsibilities.

**Background:** The Arizona Emergency Response Commission (AZERC) annually awards HMPEG grants for preparedness training related to hazardous materials. In 2016 AZERC transitioned from the Arizona Division of Emergency Management and Military Affairs (AZDEMA) to ADEQ under the State lean transformation program.

ADEQ changed the requirements for HMPEG submittals to include a three-year work-plan for training; which Santa Cruz County submitted via the Santa Cruz County Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC.)

Our training plan was approved by ADEQ and we were awarded funding to conduct year-one of our training to include propane, haz mat in confined space, over the road tank car, and flammable liquid training.

The only documentation ADEQ provided to us was the Award Letter as they do not require a signed sub-recipient agreement. Legal has reviewed this Award Letter and recommends we simply retain the e-mails between ADEQ leadership and SCC OEM on grant reporting and other questions regarding allowable expenditures.

**Recommendation:** The Director of Emergency Management recommends that Santa Cruz County accepts the Award of funds from ADEQ for year-one of our three-year HMEPG training plan.

**Financial Implications:** This is a fully funded HMEPG grant without a required County share or match. There are no financial implications for Santa Cruz County.






